Nigeria's Brand of Federalism: The Trigger for Political Crisis in the Country?

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Abstract:

The regional autonomy, which was the hallmark of the First Republic, was replaced by the administration of Yakubu Gowon, which oversaw the over-centralisation of political and fiscal powers.
