Crossing the Boundaries of Ignorance: Learning Business and History through the Indigenous Language

Abstract:

The Teaching-Learning process is essentially a series of psychological episodes which is better mastered through the application of the right language. Many teachers teaches without their students grasping anything because of the medium of communicating the knowledge. Learning takes place only when the language of conveyance is mutually understandable to both the teacher and the leaner. However, the reverse is the case in most African countries where the English language is the only legitimate language of knowledge conveyance in schools.
